



The use of snowmobiles and all terrain vehicles are covered under legislation passed by the Province of Saskatchewan and violations of this act are enforced by the local RCMP. Persons owning and operating any snowmobile or ATV should know what is permitted under this piece of legislation. Please contact any member of the RCMP by calling 753-2171 to discuss your rights as a property owner or ATV owner.

Complaints under the All Terrain Vehicles Act should be directed to the RCMP. As responsible vehicle owners please

respect the rights of private property owners and members of this community. Violations may be issued for excessive noise, intrusion onto private property of any other violation covered under the above mentioned legislation.

Town Bylaw 01/10 allows snowmobiles and ATV's to operate in Town limits Only for the purpose of exiting or entering the community. When entering or exiting the most direct route should be followed.



The Kinettes worked out a way to canvas, collect and deliver food to our shelves and follow the current health guidelines. On October 31st they provided over 700 kgs of food to us.





In Loving Memory of CARL REHMAN SEPTEMBER 3, 1932 - NOVEMBER 4, 2020

Carl Andrew Rehman was born on September 3, 1932 in Macklin Sask. He was the third of seven children born to Frank X and Mary Rehman. He grew up on the family farm located on the

Saskatchewan side of the border road between Macklin and Provost. Carl attended Meadowlands School until he completed Grade 6. He struggled with undiagnosed dyslexic and autistic challenges. Reading and writing didn't come easy and he had to work hard to pass his grades. His father pulled him from school at the age of 14 so that he could help out on the farm. Being the oldest boy in the family, he was required to take on a lot of responsibilities early on. He loved animals, especially dogs, but horses not so much. Being that he had to work with them, they were unappealing to him.

Carl met his future wife, Irma Schiller, when he was very young. Irma's family owned the Schiller Bakery in Macklin. He would someday reminisce, "I loved her from the moment I first saw her. She was pretty and always kind." He was devastated when she left for the convent. Long story short, she returned nine years later, and they rekindled their friendship and fell in love. They were married in June of 1962. Together, they raised six children and made their life on the family farm.

Carl and Irma worked very hard to keep the wolf from the door, especially in the years that Operation Lift prohibited the right to sell wheat. Despite the challenges that were thrown at them, they managed to keep the family fed and the bills paid. Carl's work ethic was second to none, but Sundays were revered as a day to attend Mass, to rest and to spend with his wife and kids. After church, while Irma prepared lunch, Carl would put on one of his favourite old time dance records and he would dance with the kids in the living room, teaching them the fox trot, the waltz and the polka. The little ones got to stand on his feet while he carefully moved them in time to the music. Sundays were also for gopher hunting, trips to Dilberry Lake, picnics, playing board games or visiting with the neighbours and playing cards. Sometimes, just for the fun of it, he would announce, "Who wants to go for a drive?" He would pretend to be lost on the backroads and the next thing they knew, they would be at a destination he had in mind all along.

Carl loved music. He sang out loud to every Johnny Cash, Marty Robbins and Burl Ives song. You couldn't keep him in his chair at a dance, either. Once Irma's legs were tired, each daughter, sister, mother, aunt and neighbour lady got asked if they would like to dance.

In 1997, Carl turned the farm over to his two sons, but chose to continue living there to assist with the Border Bison Enterprise that slowly evolved. He took great pride in the Bison venture and helped where he could with the herd. He enjoyed selling bison meat and Irma's handmade moccasins at the Farmers Market in Provost. Their Bison burgers became well known in the local and surrounding areas.

Carl loved hockey. He tried to take in all the NHL games on TV but nothing pleased him more than an exciting Macklin Mohawk game at the local rink. He would talk about it for days after.

Carl was no stranger to the curling rink either. He curled in the league for 69 straight years. He was really hoping to make 70, but ill health prevented him from hitting the ice one last time.

Carl was a member of the Knights of Columbus. He had a deep respect for the members and for the fraternal service order. He enjoyed the game of Bunnock and the annual tournament held down at the lake each year. Playing Bingo and going to the casino in his later years were indulgences he allowed himself.

Carl loved the simple pleasures of life: coffee time, harvest time, the smell of hay, the cold nose on a dog, and the warmth of a bonfire. His favourite meal: BBQ Ribs. He took pride in his kids and discovered joy when he became a Grandpa. Holding a little hand was an experience that he savoured. Each grandchild was a treasure. He attended ball games, school events, music festivals and graduations, always bragging to others, "That's my grandson at the bat" or ... "That's my granddaughter with the beautiful voice." He would sit amongst his granddaughters on the couch at Christmas and say, "I probably look like a thorn amongst all these beautiful roses!" Carl tried his best to remain active and motivated after Irma passed away in 2013, but the light in his eyes became much dimmer. He fell ill in 2018 and after a lengthy stay in hospital, was transferred to the Long Term Care Facility in Provost. He appreciated the compassion and care and the friendly atmosphere there. When his daughter, Laurie, asked him a few weeks ago if there was anything he wanted her to bring to him, he replied, "I have everything I need. Just bring me love." Carl is survived by his children: Melody (Tracy) Kuhn of Reward, SK and their children: Nathan (Heather), Daniel (Kristy), Mandy (Andrew) Herrick, Brian (Kaitlyn), Janelle (Justin) Fischer, Jaylon (Hannah), Alison (Cam) Hollman, Brett, Tyrell and Dallan; Bob Rehman of Macklin, SK; Laurie Letain of Provost, AB and her children, Luke, Cole and Liam; Mark of Stettler, AB and his children, Kelsey and Hannah; Verlie (Lyle) Liebrecht of Unity, SK and children Amy (Ty) Comeau, Ty, Jenifer and Kaylee; and Donna Punk of Humboldt, SK and her children, Dylan (Megan), Tristan, Declan and Jade. Carl is great-grandfather to Olivia, Beau, Leo, Wrenley, Waylen, Asher, Tru, Addelyn and three more on the way.
