

Town Seeks Approval For Long-Term Infrastructure Project

The Town of Macklin has made application to the Saskatchewan Municipal Board for approval to complete an extensive and long-term infrastructure project. The project would see all sections south of Surveyed Road upgraded with new sub-base and base material, hot mix asphalt, and where applicable new curb/sidewalk. The project will also include the replacement of old cast iron water main lines, where required, one year in advance of the planned street renewal. It is proposed that this program be pursued using the Local Improvement process with no right for property owners to petition against the project. This requires the approval of the Saskatchewan Municipal Board, both a complete review of the project as well as a mandatory public meeting.

On August 21, 2018 members of the Saskatchewan Municipal Board hosted a public meeting to hear presentation both for and against the proposed project. Affected property owners also had the opportunity to provide written submissions prior to the meeting. Approximately 50 people attended the public meeting with seven individuals taking the opportunity to make statements to the committee. A further twenty-two letters were submitted for the committee's consideration.

It is anticipated that the decision of the Saskatchewan Municipal Board will be received within the next sixty days. Once the report has been received it is the intention of the Town of Macklin to share with the community the decision of the committee in its entirety.

In game 1 the Lakers took on the Kenosee Cubs. The game was a tight affair going scoreless until the 5th inning when the Lakers put 3 on the board and never looked back from there winning 7-1. Jared Hillis was the winning pitcher throwing the complete game with 9 strikeouts.

In game 2 the Lakers took on the Regina Red Dogs. The game was very close with the Lakers holding a 1-0 lead until the 5th inning where Regina scored 2 to go up 2-1. The Lakers showed a lot of heart in this one and came together as the team they are and tied the game up 2-2 in the 6th. With some key defensive plays in the top of the 7th the Lakers held Regina in check and took it into their own hands in the bottom of the 7th walking it off with the 3-2 win. 

RCMP – Macklin Report –July 31 – Aug 20, 2018

A PARABLE – Caragana Christians

Jesus had a wonderful way of finding parables in the common things of daily life, parables of truth and faith. He took a coin, a prodigal son, a Samaritan, and found in them gospel. I think if Jesus had walked our prairies of Saskatchewan in the past many years he might have found a parable, a little gospel here, too—in the caragana bushes that grew on the Prairie. I write "grew" (past tense, quite intentionally) for the 'caragana' is now considered 'a thing of the past' as are so many other good and worthwhile things. So is there a parable for us, we who call ourselves Christians, in the prairie caragana?

Most caraganas were planted in long rows in the fields to capture the winter snow, to create windbreaks, to stand firm against the erosion of the soil during those dark days on the Prairies. So it is that God calls His people to stand firm against the erosions of our darkening times. If not the people of God, who will stand firm against the erosion of tolerance? Years ago, some met intolerance when they came here to the Prairies. Some are finding it again today, not only here but tragically in death and destruction all over the world. Who will stand against the erosion of tolerance today if it is not the people of God who proclaim the love of God for every person.

In our cities we now surround some of the newest neighbourhoods with walls and gates; we pass by the families next door hardly knowing their names, never mind their joys and sorrows; we use texting as opposed to talking to each other.

Who will stand against this erosion of neighbourliness, of love, if not Christians, the people whom God has called to live in friendly and loving relationships?

And so many other negatives—the ugliness in politics; the lack of honesty in business; the impatience, the impoliteness in shopping malls; the drugs that infiltrate our towns and schools and ruin the lives of our young people.

Who will stand against this erosion of honesty, of common decency if not us, we who call ourselves Christian?

If the caragana stood firm against the erosion of the soil, surely God's people must stand firm against the erosion of tolerance, honesty, love, here and all over the world.

The secret of the caragana's strength was in its roots—they were wide, they were deep in the Prairie soil. The Psalmist sang "happy are those who have their roots in God for they are like trees". This, then, the secret of the caragana is the secret of "caragana Christians" roots deeply embedded always in God's love and power. Powerful parable, powerful gospel.

HISTORICAL FACT

Macklin, Primate, Evesham, and Cactus Lake were primarily British Settlements. However Germans-from-Russia arrived early to settle the area around Grosswerder. According St. Joseph's Colony 1905-1930, compiled by the Oblate Priests in the colony, "The first settlements in St. Joseph's Colony around Tramping Lake, spread westward and soon a flood of immigrants covered the area for 50 to 60 miles distant creating the parishes of Grosswerder, Denzil, Macklin, St. Peter, St. Donates even crossing the provincial borders to form Rosenheim, Provost, Cadogan in Alberta."
